
Youth Systems Strengthening Community of Practice (CoP)



My Story







What I do

- Joined Search's "Youth Talk" project aimed at amplifying young people's voices through media and outreach programs in 2019 and learned how to produce radio shows to talk about critical social issues in my community
- Conduct live talk shows that engage stakeholders and feature intergenerational dialogues

The radio show helps to:

- Amplify the voice of young people to participate meaningfully in peace building initiatives,
- Strengthen mutual understanding and collaboration between young people and adults in South Sudan
- Capture and share learning and tools among policymakers and practitioners







What inspires me?

"In South Sudan, when a girl is raped, her parents often force her to marry the Perpetrator (rapist), receiving a dowry in the process."

I often see girls treated as mere objects of transaction. Thus, "communities legitimize and perpetuate gender-based violence. Men can rape a girl knowing that it will make her a wife".







Accomplishments

Radio Talk Show

- Young people are aware of the norms affecting them in the community.
- They are informed, educated, entertained and engaged through the radio programs.
- Communities started opening up on the harmful norms and traditions.

Outreach

- Eight intergenerational dialogues were conducted in eight locations, over 600 adults and young people came together to shape solutions to their communities.
- Intergenerational dialogue network was created by the members and actively working.
- Collaboration between young people and adults are strengthen.

Advocacy

Advocacy meetings were conducted with government officials: military and police generals, ministers and speaker of the national legislative assembly, judges from Judiciary of South Sudan, UN Youth envoy, Humanitarian experts, community-based and civil society organizations, and lastly local chiefs and community leaders across South Sudan.

Achievements

- Gender Desk was established in all states and administrative areas of South Sudan.
- One-stop centers established.
- Juvenile Court for GBV Launched.
- GBV toll free-line launched.


